CherYsh Programs

CherYsh is a registered non-profit organization that strives to enhance learning avenues for girl children and livelihood opportunities for resource-poor women in rural India.

CherYsh currently runs 18 Shikshas (After-School Learning Centres), and will expand to 25 in the year 2016-17. Two Community Kitchens are functional and provide livelihood to 20 women in two villages. Ten Nursing Scholars will benefit from CherYsh scholarships. By March 2017 CherYsh will reach 15 Villages, establish 25 Shikshas, and prepare the Kitchen for medium-large scale production.

INTRODUCTION

CherYsh impacts the lifecycle of a girl from early learning and skill development, to livelihoods. We EDUCATE – PREPARE – SECURE rural girls and women.

In keeping with the Vision and Mission of the organization, CherYsh, in 215-16 continued to build strong programs to Educate, Prepare and Secure rural girls and women. CherYsh directly implemented projects in 7 villages. Eleven After School Learning Centres were established, and 2 Community Kitchens were set up, successfully expanding operations. New staff was hired from the target communities of rural women.

Villages that were remote, backward and in need of development support were identified, and in consultation with village authorities at the Panchayat, Anganwadis, and Taluk office these were selected for interventions in education, skills, and livelihoods for girls and women.

The year also saw a deepening of partnerships, which created resource and training support from Hubballi, and economic opportunities in Haliyal.



CHERYSH SHIKSHAS

Eleven After-School Learning Centers with a total of 351 students were established in 7 villages of Haliyal Taluk, Uttara Kannada district. Over 50 per cent of the children have shown improvement in speaking, reading, writing and comprehension of English.

Eleven Learning Facilitators were trained to help children with their learning needs. The Facilitators use a kit replete with workbooks, charts, flash cards, and library books. CherYsh centres demonstrated the ease, and joy of learning, and was a reflection of the child's

confidence, and self-esteem. Talent amongst children was identified, and they actively participated in events to showcase their talents.

- Teachers in Jogunkoppa village organized the 'CherYsh Day' celebrations. 80 children from all Shikshas came together to participate in a talent showcase. Music, sport, art, and dance champions emerged, and were celebrated! The community, parents, school and local administration showed great interest in the abundance of talent amongst children and the Learning Facilitators.
- Parent-Teacher meetings were conducted in three villages to discuss the progress of children and to elicit feedback. The Shiksha program received positive response from parents.



CONTINUOUS LEARNING PROGRAMS FOR FACILITATORS

Regular sessions (Teaching and Management skills) have been conducted to ensure a continuous learning environment and support for the Learning Facilitators of the CherYsh Shikshas. Learning facilitators have shown dramatic improvement in confidence levels. 70 per cent have shown improvement in ability to complete the teaching modules, manage their class, and in the evaluation process.



Rural Innovation Through Education (RITE) – In association with the BVB College of Engineering, Hubballi, CherYsh initiated RITE, a volunteer engagement program enhance learning levels of children, and build capacity for teaching among Learning Facilitators. 40 BVB students contributed 30 hours over the year 2015-16 to improve teaching skills in English





CherYsh Shiksha Library Program – A long cherished dream, the CherYsh Library Program took off to a start with a tiny library of 200 illustrated storybooks. The aim is to develop English reading skills beyond the textbook and expose children to simple everyday vocabulary. CherYsh Shiksha children showed great interest in this colorful collection.



VOCATIONAL ASSET SKILLS TRAINING (VAST)

CherYsh launched - Vocational Asset Skills Training (VAST) program to prepare girls for economic self-sustainability.

CherYsh successfully conducted an outreach program in the Haliyal First Grade College to determine the areas of interest for jobs, for the 800 girls attending college. The VAST (Vocational Asset Skill Training) program presented an opportunity to understand short-term vocational courses. This program aims to equip young girls with job/enterprise enhancing skills through scholarships and internships. 40 per cent of them expressed interest in hospitality, food processing, and entrepreneurship.

The CherYsh Scholars, St.Martha's College of Nursing, Bangalore.

CherYsh was able to support 10 young women with scholarships to complete their nursing studies at St. Martha's College of Nursing. Nine of them completed the program with first class scores. Four nurses were employed and repaid a percentage of the scholarship amount. This enabled financial support to greater number of eligible candidates.



CherYsh Community Kitchens – 20 women from the kitchens developed skills, and earning potential through the CherYsh Community Kitchens. CherYsh successfully launched the Serve and Lead Training (SaLT) session in collaboration with the team from the Gateway Lakeside – a Taj group hotel. Women were given training in hygiene, and recipe for 5 marketable food products. Orders for products from the Community Kitchens have grown over the year from 10 kilograms/per month to 70-90 Kilograms/month. The Kitchens also provided a daily mid-evening snack to the children at the learning centers. These activities provide a supplementary income – approximately Rs. 1000 each per month – to the village women who otherwise are dependent on five months of agricultural revenue in the year.

The Serve and Lead Training (SaLT) was conducted to facilitate exposure for Community Kitchen members to the best practices in kitchen operations at Akshaya Patra Foundation and GATEWAY Lakeside –Hubballi. Trainings were conducted on quality benchmarks for community kitchens. Specific areas included: purchase, hygiene, production, storage, packaging and delivery.

PARTNERSHIPS

CherYsh engaged several partners for sustainability:

- The local Taluka (local government) office, from where we get support of education officers, forest officers (environment), revenue officers, and others. We obtained maps of villages, firewood for the kitchens, and conducted environment awareness programs for children.
- The EID Parry group, Gateway Lakeside, the Akshaya Patra Foundation, The BVB College of Engineering, Hubballi, Akshara Foundation, and all other partners and donors, provide us a strong foundation of support.

DEVELOPMENT DIALOGUE – PARTICIPATION

The CherYsh Team participated in the Development Dialogue conference organized by the Deshpande Foundation, Hubballi. The Conference brought together over hundreds of practitioners, academics, investors, grassroots activists, philanthropists and entrepreneurs from across the world.

“The conference gathers together the partners and grantees in the Hubli Sandbox to collectively take stock of our progress and to dialogue about the Sandbox and what we can do to move forward. The conference also serves as a vehicle for outsiders to learn about the challenges within development and the NGOs/nonprofit sector and to allow them to explore alternative forms of engagement through philanthropy and/or activism.”

CherYsh aim is to build partners, and develop resources in the region.



FUNDRAISERS

Donor engagement, and fundraising events this year brought much awareness of CherYsh's efforts towards rural development. The TCS World 10K Marathon, #HelloHALIYAL campaign, the Jewellery for a Cause and Serendipity were key fundraiser events in the year. CherYsh continued to innovate and enhance contribution through participation.



CherYsh at the TCS Marathon in Bangalore – Five runners ran for Mission Rural Girl – CherYsh’s goal to improve learning and livelihoods in rural India. This was the first event-based fundraising effort in India.



#HelloHALIYAL

This social media fundraising campaign was aimed at turning attention to the needy villages of Haliyal Taluk. The idea was to create awareness about the development efforts under way to support rural girls and women in the journey from Learning to Livelihood. The CherYsh Shiksha and Community Kitchens got the attention of audiences globally.



Jewelry for a Cause

The event conducted in collaboration with a donor drew attention of high net worth individuals to the development work we undertake. A percentage of the Jewelry sales was donated to CherYsh.

Music for Development – Serendipity event

This fundraiser entitled – SERENDIPITY was special fundraiser for CherYsh for its invaluable work to enhance quality of lives of people in hard-to-reach rural regions. The event was conducted in collaboration with The Bangalore School of Music. It brought to Bangalore, world-renowned pianist, and professor at the Vienna Conservatory - Marialena Fernandes. She performed along with the trio of talented performers the ThreeX, who are musicians and entertainers wanting to make a difference to the world through music.

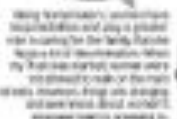


JOURNEYS ON DIFFICULT TERRAIN

Different tunes: When young Siddis sang Austrian and Polish numbers

Bengaluru: It was music to the ears. A world-renowned pianist, Maria Polina, was here and the Siddis of India — blessed with the gift of rhythm — left the stage on fire as they performed under one roof for the first time in history.

Polina, Maria Polina, Permon is also a professor at the Vienna Conservatory. "I have performed with rural children across the world but every time it feels like the first time. It is not always about classical or western music. I remember seeing European musicians from protected areas and make them work with children from unprotected areas, like in this case, the Siddis from Bengal village in Bengal," she said. "The Siddis have not only been a musical institution but also a strong pulse for rhythm. They picked up a Polish song within minutes," she added.

er helped us break down the words," said James Foyak, team leader of the group. The team also performed a traditional Siddi dance portraying village life and themselves. "These are the songs of our village. When we need to learn in the houses, we used to sing about a Siddi girl, her beautiful face, broad hips and laughter," she added.

The girls were trained as a part of an NGO's after-school programme. Charita works to improve the skills of girls and women in rural India giving them a chance of a better

lifeline. "It is an immense joy. Siddis have a special talent towards music and sports. This is where music learning is a great process for them. They are learning much faster and it is a lot faster because they are taught specially," said Charita, CEO, Charita.

"Music is a strong creative mechanism," added Charita. Among the Siddis girls is a boy, Irfan, who's one of the best male dancers in the village. "He loves dancing and is the centre of attention," said Mahesh K, his uncle who played the drum for their

dance performance.

Stanna, a young Siddi woman, is a field staff officer for the NGO. She plays guitar and teaches dance to the out-of-school. "This is the biggest programme we are performing. A lot of girls from out of school because they have to travel to another village for higher studies," she said.

Stanna, Navekar, has no children near by village or in school. "It is very difficult. We keep ourselves occupied by singing or going to school and on the way back," she said.
