7 NEW SHIKSHAS OPEN

Villages Halamaddi, Timmapur, Sankanakoppa (2 Shikshas), Tattigere, Bantargalli, and Dodakoppa now have CherYsh Shiksha Centres. An induction programme was held for all the new Learning Facilitators before the school year began.

SHIKSHAS GET LIBRARY BOOKS

Mini libraries are slowly being set up in the Shikshe Centres. 2 such sets were donated by Pratham Books. These have story books for different age groups with illustrations the children can enjoy. The stories are in Kannada and English, and some of them are bilingual.

HEALTHIER SNACKS FOR SHIKSHA STUDENTS

CherYsh worked with Pristine Organics to create a more healthier formula for the evening snack, laddoo, that is supplied at CherYsh Shikshas. It was ensured that the laddoos provide a balanced nutrition to the children. The new recipe used all local and household items.



HEATH CAMP FOR SHIKSHA CHILDREN

A health camp was conducted in 18 villages across 27 Shiksha centres in partnership with EID Parry and Wockhardt.

Shiksha students were tested for various parameteres such as height, weight, anemia, iron deficiency, vitamin A and D deficiency. And we are happy to say, the effort revealed that our Haliyal children are healthy!

CLEANING CAMPAIGNS ACROSS SHIKSHAS

On 2nd October, Gandhi Ji's birthday was celebrated in the Shikshas by conducting a Shramdaan or cleaning campaign in the villages.
Representatives of the Forest Department and Panchayat were a part of this.

The programme started off with a play depicting the importance of cleanliness and sanitation, by students who were trained with Mr. Sidappa Bradar. Students then set off to clean various parts of their village. They were joined by parents and other community members, to support the children's efforts and initiative.

This campaign was covered by many local newspapers.

A Personality Development

This programme was conducted in all Shikshas, It comprised of many activities including plays, skits, craft, pottery, etc.

RITE VOLUNTEER PROGRAMME

Rural Innovation Through Education (RITE) is where engineering students from BVB College, Hubbali get involved with the Shiksha Project. A two day camp was conducted where the RITE volunteers interacted with the village communities to understand the problems they face.

They then submitted a report with solutions that involve their tech knowledge.

CHERYSH DAY CELEBRATIONS

CherYsh Day is one day out of the year when all Shikshas put together a celebration in their villages. Learninng Facilitators host competitions and games for the children, the village community joins and celebrates with the children, a day to be young and carefree.







LF TRAINING CO-ORDINATOR

Mr. James D'Souza, High School Teacher is appointed as co-ordinator of trainings. Being from Haliyal, he worked really hard to become the teacher in his Taluk, studied at the Regional Institute of Language to gain a functional command over English.

He is someone the Learning Facilitators respect and look upto. They are also ready to learn a lot from him. Mr. James will conduct trainings every staurday, this academic year.

SCHOLARSHIP SUPPORT TO ASPIRING GIRLS FROM HALIYAL

Sunita, Madevi, Akshata, Jyoti and Sheetal are five girls from Haliyal, whose education and football training is supported by CherYsh through individual donors. They study in St. Aloysius College, Mangalore. Their team placed as runners up in the State level tournament held by Karnataka State Football Association.

Pavithra from Mundwad is also a very motivated girl, whose college education is supported through indidvidual donors.

SUPPORT TO NURSING SCHOLARS

Eight more nursing scholars were supported with scholarships at College of Nursing, St, Martha's Hospital, Bangalore. These aspiring young women hail from rural and poor economic background.

The scholarship is provided through the Saldanha family grant which is ear marked for this purpose.





CHERYSH @ UNICEF STATE CONSULTATION

6 girls from the villages of Haliyal attended the Karnataka State Consultation with adolsecents and young people on education, skills and career aspirations, conducted in Bangalore.

It was a very valuable experience to these young women, and they have been determined to share their experience and knowledge in their villages.

SUGARBUD NURSERY TRAINING

Women representatives of a women's group from Mundwad village attended a week long training at Nellikuppam, Tamil Nadu on Sugarcane Bud Nursery.

CherYsh organised this training for the women's group with EID Parry Ltd., Haliyal after they expressed interest in starting a Sugarbud Nursery.





MUNDWAD SHAWLS AND STOLES

A traditional technique called 'killa work' was discovered in Shehnaz
Begum from Mundwad village. She was turned into a resource person who trained many women from her village in this skill. CherYsh provided financial support and design inputs to create the Mundwad Shawls and Stoles group.

The women have completed their first round of prodcution.

SUGARBUD NURSERY GROUP

Women who received training in Tamil Nadu came back to their village and trained other women. They formed a group of 10 women who started the nursery. They received 50% capital as grant and 50% as loan from CherYsh, as well as capacity building support and training.

They set-up the nursery themselves with inputs and inspections done by scientists from EID Parry. They produced 72,000 saplings in their first round of production with great success. They are now planning for further investment and expansion.

CHERYSH COMMUNITY KITCHEN READY FOR EXPANSIONS

The Community Kitchens have registered as an Self Help Group and received their FSSAI registration. This means they are ready for the next step.



REGISTRATION UNDER NRLM

All our SHGs have registered under the National Rural Livelihood Mission project under the Government of India. This will open avenues for capacity building and financial aid from the Government.

SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT THROUGH SHGS

The Self Help Groups have enabled the women to create a livelihood and source of income for themselves, outside of jobs based on strict gender roles prevalent in rural areas. This has given them income, but also a voice in their households and recognition in their community,

These women have become confident in their abilities and inspire other women in their villages. Also, it has created a woman only space for them, where they support each other through roadblocks in their enterprise as well as personal hurdles.

CHERYSH PROJECTS GET ATTENTION FROM VARIOUS AVENUES

Women led enterprises in villages has attracted attention from various stakeholders.
